The cover image illustrates the potential of psychedelic therapy to transform perception in patients with anorexia nervosa. In this artistic representation, vibrant colors and patterns emanate from the silhouette of a person's profile, symbolizing the expanded consciousness and altered self-perception reported by participants in the first clinical trial of psilocybin treatment for anorexia. While physical appearance remained unchanged for most participants, many described profound internal shifts—experiencing their bodies as "vessels" rather than defining features of identity. This visual metaphor captures the essence of what one participant described: "Things might not look that different from the outside, but they feel completely different from the inside."
